Over the past weeks, we have seen and heard from leadership and Public Health experts the need to stay vigilant in our fight against COVID-19. IN THE NEWS

On April 19, 2021, the federal government released <u>Budget 2021</u>. As part of the Budget, the government is allocating an additional \$1.2 billion in 2021-22 to continue supporting the COVID-19 response in <u>Indigenous Communities</u>, including \$478.1 million on a cash basis to continue to support the ongoing public health response to COVID-19 in Indigenous communities. Budget 2021 also proposes to invest an additional \$760.8 million for the Indigenous Community Support Fund to help First Nations and Métis Nation communities, and urban and off-reserve Indigenous organizations serving Indigenous peoples meet the unique needs of their populations during the COVID-19 pandemic.

On April 20, 2021, the <u>Government of Saskatchewan announced</u> that it was expanding capacity to provide secure, responsive virtual health care, so patients can safely, securely and conveniently access services well into the future. The Ministry of Health and eHealth Saskatchewan are developing an action plan to enhance virtual services, focusing on security, privacy and user experience.

On April 21, 2021, the federal government highlighted that Budget 2021 sets a goal of on average \$10 a day child-care within the next five years. Through this, the federal government is committing to work with provincial, territorial, and Indigenous partners to build a Canada-wide, community-based early learning and child care system.

On April 21, the Province of Saskatchewan announced it will be using <u>AstraZeneca to immunize adults 40 years</u> and older.

On April 23, the National Advisory Committee on Immunization (NACI) lowered the age of eligibility and recommended the AstraZeneca vaccine to anyone 30 years of age and older.

COVID-19 VACCINE UPDATE

There have been 23,085 vaccine doses administered in Saskatchewan First Nations communities as of April 25, 2021. Out of the 23,085 doses, 17,315 doses are first dose and 5,770 doses are second dose. Hence 33.8% (17,315/51,269) of people over the age 18 living in Saskatchewan First Nations communities have received their first dose. 5,770 (11.3% of the eligible population) individuals have received their first and second doses.



Is the AstraZeneca Vaccine Safe?

One of the side effects being noted in media coverage of the AstraZeneca vaccine is the risk of blood clotting. **As of April 26**, four cases have been noted in Canada, but none in Indigenous communities.

Health Canada's position on the AstraZeneca vaccine has not changed: The potential risk of blood clotting is very rare, and the benefits of the vaccine in protecting against COVID-19 outweigh its potential risks. Health Canada's findings are based on a sound and thorough <u>safety review</u> of all evidence available.

Pharmacy Vaccination Pilot Project

Select pharmacies in 14 Saskatchewan communities will start to receive vaccine on April 29 as part of a pilot program to offer COVID-19 vaccinations. Up to 63 pharmacies will participate in a small-scale rollout to refine distribution and vaccination processes.
